Dr. Palsa opened the meeting by having everyone stand and say the pledge allegiance to the flag. He then introduced officers and board members.

Minutes were approved for the April 2014 meeting.

Nets

RARC has the first and only D-STAR digital repeater in the area. 147.255 (+ 600), 443.7125 (+ 5) and now 1284.0000 (-20). In addition to our Wednesday local D Star net (below), we link the D Star VHF module for the National Capital Region D Star Net on Wednesday nights at 9pm. On Tuesday nights at 9pm, we link our VHF module to the North Carolina D Star Net, and on Sunday nights at 9pm to the South Eastern D Star Weather Net.

Beginning on March 5, 2014, the RARC D Star Net which meets on Wednesday nights at 8:00pm will be accessible on our three D Star modules, all of which will be linked. You can use any of the three frequencies, 2 meters, 70 cm or 23 cm, and you should hear and be heard by everyone. If you participate in the net via DVAP or DV Dongle, you must link your device to Ref 007D rather than to any of our modules. Since the W4FJ stack will all be linked to Ref 007D, anyone linked to that reflector will be connected to the net.

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This Months' Speaker and Meeting Topic!

This month's speaker, Rob Thomas, KC4NYK, has been a ham since getting his Novice license in 1986. After writing a Morse Code practice program for his then 6 year old son and when accompanying him for the Novice test, Rob took it also - and passed! With an Industrial Design degree from Pratt Institute, Rob has been blessed to have the opportunity to design everything from Tools for Stanley Tools to Watchbands for Timex and the original prototype of the IBM PC. After opening his own design firm in Richmond in 1980 Rob jumped feet first into the cyber world buying a Timex Sinclair microcomputer which led him to take computer science classes at VCU. His first commercial project resulted in his collaborating with software developers and Computer Based Training experts from UVA to create "CourseBuilder" the first PC-based authoring system which was bought by Houghton Mifflin and became the core of their Authoring package for 10 years. After a long career consulting for national ad agencies and Fortune 500 companies nationwide, founding two software companies, two furniture companies and mentoring young entrepreneurs, Rob can be found these days plugging away at various projects from monitoring beer temperatures on the iPhone to communicating worldwide on less than 5 watts (QRP) with Software Defined Radio. His program this week kicks off a 3 part series on Software Defined Radio and is intended to initiate hams into the arcane world of Linux, SDR software and a dizzying host of hardware from BeagleBones to Raspberry Pi's and DVB-T dongles to SoftRock, Soft66 and an

array of kits. A fully developed SD card image to make much of the grunt labor disappear is in the works and will be made available for download. Nevertheless an overview is a must to navigate this very fertile ground for exploration and will be the basis of this first presentation. Richmond Amateur Radio Club (RARC) 3rd Annual - June 2014 "Radio Run"

Purpose:

RARC wants to encourage ALL amateur radio operators to be MORE active on ANY band, frequency, or mode! Even if you are not (yet) a licensed amateur radio operator, you can still participate!

Rules:

- You must make at least 1 (one)
 QSO each day of the month of June
- 2. You must <u>operate</u> on an Amateur Band/Frequency

- You must generate RF on an Amateur Band/Frequency at your station
- If you are NOT a licensed Amateur Radio Operator you must <u>listen</u> to an Amateur Band/Frequency using an RF receiver
- 5. Not Allowed (QSO does not count)
 - a. DV-Dongle (the blue model)
 - b. IRLP using your phone
 - c. Echolink, etc.
- d. No "radio-reference.com" or internet based radio monitoring sites for listening. Remember, if you don't generate or receive Amateur Band/Frequency RF, the QSO does not count.
 - We're going to use the honor system for keeping track of all who complete the "Radio Run"! (Be honest – which is a pretty good policy anyway (3))
 - 7. IF you have made at least 1 (one) contact on each and every day of the month of June, please contact Jim Bates with the following information:
 - a. Call Sign (required)
 - b. Name (optional)
 - c. E-Mail Address and/or

Telephone Number (optional)

d. If you kept track of your contacts, the # of contacts you made during the month of June, 2013 (optional)

Skyline Drive - Revisited

Last year I made a trek to Beagle Gap overlook on the Skyline Drive, located just a few miles north of I-64 at Afton

Mountain. Unfortunately, there was snow in the air and the National Park Ranger drove by and told me that Skyline Drive was being closed. That was very disappointing - BUT, that was LAST year!

I made my return visit to Beagle Gap, 2,500 ASL, on Saturday, April 12, 2014. This visit was MUCH nicer than a year ago; the temperature was 60*F with a nice breeze blowing - just a beautiful day.

I decided to try and work some different antennas this year: 6m dipole (a Buddipole Deluxe setup), 2m m2 HO Loop, and a 70cm m2 HO Loop. I also brought my Icom IC-7100. Gear from last year was 6m m2 3 element beam; 2m m2 7 element beam, 70cm Diamond beam, 23cm m2 beam, and my Icom IC-9100. This proved to be a VERY different operating environment.

Why change the gear and antennas? All those beams are just a big pain in the "rear" - I drive a Camry and while I can tow a small trailer, that doesn't mean that I really like the idea of driving down I-64 at 70+MPH with beams and other "implements of destruction" (references to Arlo Guthrie) bouncing around in the trailer. Instead of doing the trailer thing, the loops and buddipole are quite compact and easy to deploy.

I arrived at Beagle Gap around 09:30 and began unpacking the gear. I set up the buddipole as a horizontal dipole for 6m (50.125) and adjusted the whips to get a low SWR. Next, I got out the speaker stand and placed the 2 HO loops right on top. 15 minutes of installation and I was ready to get on the air.

I also brought a range of HTs. I had my Icom ID-51 (2m/70cm FM/DV), Kenwood TK-5210 (2m FM/P25), and EF Johnson 5100 (33cm FM/P25). I gave a CQ with a couple of watts and made contact with LOTS of folks during the day! I talked to Win Grant (WA4SSG) on 70cm with 100mw on D-Star-line of sight makes such a difference.

I hopped on 2m SSB and started calling CQ. I have to admit, I really like one particular function of the IC-7100 - voice memory and auto-calling - I recorded my CQ (CQ CQ CQ de K8OI/P), set the timer interval (10 seconds) and just started working the band. I received a contact in just a few minutes and had a great QSO with a ham from Charlottesville - I was


really pleased, the little m2 HO loop seemed to be doing its job!

After some time, I switched over to 6m and made quite a few contacts during the day. Towards the afternoon, 6m even opened up to Florida. I tried unsuccessfully for 15 minutes to make contact, but unfortunately, I was in the midst of packing up my gear and had to leave.

Driving home, I realized that I really missed the performance of the beams. The loops did an OK job, but I wasn't able to make some of the contacts I'd made last year and the 2 biggest differences were beams and the transceiver. There is always something to work on in the hobby!
